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# Synthesis of $\gamma$ -carboline *N*-oxide under gold(I)-catalysis and *C*-1 amino and fluoro $\gamma$ -carboline.

ABSTRACT

Intramolecular gold (I)-catalyzed cyclization of 2-alkynylindole-3-carbaldehyde oximes enabled direct construction of the unknown  $\gamma$ -carboline *N*-oxide scaffold at ambient temperature. This reaction proceeded through an interesting 6-endo-dig mechanism and afforded the desired products with satisfactory to high yields. The scope and limitations of the methodology were evaluated and the final compounds fully characterized. From the 3-phenyl-*N*-oxide derivative, fluorination assays were achieved in two steps including the design of several C-1 ammonium salts and their nucleophilic displacements by fluorine to yield 1-fluoro- $\gamma$ -carboline.

### 1. Introduction

Indole-containing fused heterocyclic systems, such as indolocarbazoles,<sup>1</sup> carbolines,<sup>2</sup> and azinoindoles<sup>3</sup> have demonstrated their potential as bioactive compounds and are used in a number of pharmaceutical reagents.<sup>4</sup> Therefore, with a view to increasing molecular diversity, the development of efficient methodologies to design and functionalize fused indole heterocycles is crucial.<sup>5</sup> In this area, transition metal-catalyzed enyme cyclizations have become a powerful strategy to generate functionalized cyclic indole structures.<sup>6</sup> Our team recently reported a tandem silver-catalyzed cyclization/nucleophilic functionalization of 2-alkynylindole-3-carbaldehyde oximes to provide original 1,3-disubstituted  $\gamma$ -carboline *N*-oxides which were then involved in several reactions such as *in situ* S<sub>N</sub>Ar reactions after a PyBrop *N*-oxide activation.<sup>7</sup>

Despite our efforts, however, several nucleophilic substitutions such as fluorinations failed. The stability of the O-PyBrop leaving group and the use of a poor nucleophile could explain this result. We therefore envisioned developing a strategy able to furnish the *N*-oxide derivative, which would then be subjected to the nucleophilic fluorinations using ammonium salts as leaving groups. To achieve the first objective, we became interested in the potential of gold(I)-catalyzed reactions as homogenous gold catalysis.<sup>8</sup>

Reactions involving this transition metal have proven to be an efficient synthetic tool to allow the nucleophilic addition of an alkyne bond, affording original cyclization products<sup>9</sup> with a highly atom-economical strategy and without the need for experimental precautions against moisture or ambient atmosphere.<sup>10</sup>

One synthetic pathway to generate C-1 substituted  $\gamma$ -carboline heterocycles was described by Verma's group who reported a **Table 1.** Synthesis of *E*-oximes of type **I**<sup>a</sup>.

facile access to *N*-methyl pyridoindoles fused with oxazoles using a gold-catalyzed cascade reaction *via* a *6-endo-dig* cyclization (Figure 1).<sup>11</sup>

This innovative strategy appeared useful to incorporate a 6membered heteroaromatic ring into the indole nucleus which could be functionalized at a later stage.

In this paper, we report a fast and efficient gold-catalyzed annelation to synthesize new  $\gamma$ -carboline *N*-oxide derivatives **II** from 2-alkynylindole-3-carbaldehyde oximes **I** with perfect control of the regioselectivity of the cyclization. Furthermore, we take advantage of the isolation of the *N*-oxide derivatives to explore the synthesis of *C*-1quaternary ammonium salts which will serve to achieve unprecedented  $\gamma$ -carboline *C*-1 fluorinations under S<sub>N</sub>Ar.

### 2. Results and discussion

In order to set up the gold-catalyzed cyclization, we first designed (3*E*)-2-alkyne-3-oximeindoles **3** in a two-step synthesis from 2-bromo-3-formyl-1*H*-indole derivatives **1a-c** (Table 1).<sup>14</sup> Compared to our previous report, changes in Sonogashira cross-coupling conditions (*i.e.* amount of catalyst and use of THF instead of DMF) increased the yield and prevented degradation. 16 examples of 2-acynyl indoles of type **2** were obtained with yields up to 78%. For the second step, we reduced the amount of reagents without any major impact on yields, which remained up to 75% except with the NH or *N*-Me derivatives **30** and **3p**.

The desired *E*-isomers of oximes of type I were only isolated, whereas the *Z*-isomers, detected on crude material (<sup>1</sup>H NMR, ratio E/Z 9/1), were fully removed during the purification.

### 2.1. *Y*-Carboline N-oxide formation

Having in hand a representative library of I, we then focused our efforts on finding an efficient gold catalytic system to achieve the envisioned 6-endo-dig cyclization toward y-carboline N-oxide derivatives. Starting from 3a, AuCl<sub>3</sub> was first used as gold source<sup>12</sup> in CH<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub> at room temperature but proved unsuccessful as starting material was fully recovered (Table 2, entry 1). The same behavior was observed with the gold(I) complex containing chlorine atom as ligand (entries 2-3). To our delight, with the bis-(trifluoromethanesulfonyl)imide gold ligand the desired product 4a was regioselectively obtained in a 70% yield. With JohnPhosAu(MeCN)SbF<sub>6</sub>, the starting material was totally consumed and the yield increased remarkably to 96%. Next, we switched the phosphine for more substituted t-BuXPhos or t-BuBrettPhos, but yields decreased significantly indicating that the steric effects on ligands play a primordial role in the approach between the catalyst and 3a. The N-reaction leading to an aromatic pyridinium is preferred to a O-reaction and the formation of a seven-membered ring. This full regioselectivity could be explained by the gain induced by Hückel aromaticity for 4a as a driving force, versus the building of a non-aromatic cyclic system with oxygen as nucleophile.13

With the optimized conditions (entry 5), the intramolecular reaction was investigated with other compounds of type I (Table 3). With electron-donating groups such as methyl, methoxy or N,N-dimethylamine groups present in para position of the phenylalkyne moiety, yields remained up to 98% (entries 1, 2, 5, 6). The presence of an NH<sub>2</sub> group led to a small reduction in the efficiency of the reaction and **4g** was isolated in an 82% yield.

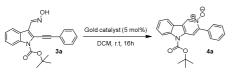

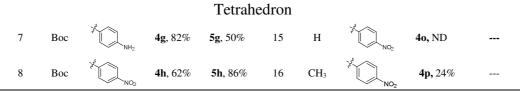

The same behavior was observed with a substituent positioned in meta or ortho positions (entries 3, 4) suggesting that the substituent interfered with the catalyst coordination. This behavior was confirmed with alkyl groups. A linear alkynyl alkane led to a better result than the reaction with a branched alkynyl alkane (entries 13, 14). Finally, on substituting the phenyl ring with thiophene, which is regarded as an *electron-rich* aromatic ring system similar to benzene, the reaction led to the attempted derivative **41** in a fairly good yield with no poisoning due to the presence of sulfur atom.

With electron-withdrawing substituents on the phenylalkyne moiety, the efficiency of the cyclization decreased slightly as the presence of chlorine atom or trifluoromethyl and cyano groups induced a small decrease in yield. This effect increased with the nitro group as **4h** was obtained in only 62% yield (entries 9-12, 8).

To further extend the scope of this efficient methodology, we changed the indolic nitrogen substitution. While the total absence of a protective group on the indolic nitrogen atom revealed a total absence of reactivity (entry 15), its methylation restored the effectiveness of the reaction. Comparing the reactions of entries 8, 15 and 16, we can therefore conclude that i) gold catalyzed cyclization is favored when the pyrrole ring is deactivated and ii) the reaction does not support the presence of an acidic proton.

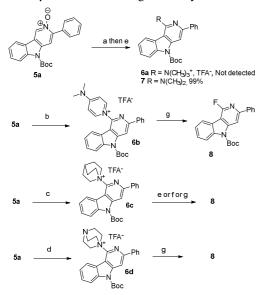

#### 2.2. Synthesis of C-1 substituted $\gamma$ -carboline

We then turned our attention to the substitution of the C-1 position with the final objective of fluorination. We started with compound **4a** and used a method based on Xiong *et al.* who reported a comprehensive study of the activation of a pyridine *N*-oxide in the presence of a tertiary amine to furnish a trialkylammonium salt.<sup>15</sup>

The assay was performed with trimethylamine, TFAA for 2h at room temperature but unfortunately the TBAF treatment at the end of the procedure led to demethylation and derivative 7 was the sole compound isolated in a near quantitative yield (Scheme 1). All attempts to isolate **6a** remained unsuccessful. To circumvent this undesired elimination, we then used successively 4-(dimethyamino)pyridine, quinuclidine and finally DABCO which led to the corresponding ammonium salts **6b-d** with yields between 50 and 62%.

Pyridinium salt **6b** and DABCO salt **6d** appeared as too stable to allow any nucleophilic substitution in the presence of TBAF. Fortunately with **6c**, the substitution occurred and **8** was isolated in a low 25% yield using TBAF in THF at 60°C. To be able to perform the fluorination under microwave irradiation we replaced the solvent with CH<sub>3</sub>CN and performed the reaction at 120°C for 30 minutes. In this case, fluorination of **6b** led to the attempted *C*-1-fluoro- $\gamma$ -carboline **8** in a higher 35% yield.

Nevertheless, during LC-MS monitoring a partial Boc deprotection was clearly observed.<sup>15</sup> To be able to quantify the fluorination rate, we first envisaged full Boc removal by adding TFA to the reaction mixture at the end of the reaction. Unfortunately this additional treatment led to a complete

degradation. We therefore added at the end of each reaction a small amount of  $Boc_2O$  with 4-DMAP/Et<sub>3</sub>N to trap the deprotected derivative. Starting from highly stable **6b**, the *C*-1 fluoro derivative **8** was isolated in a 13 % yield whereas the alkylammonium salts **6c-d** led to **8** in better 49 and 43 % yields respectively.

#### 3. Conclusion

In this paper we described the first synthesis of  $\gamma$ -carboline-*N*-oxide under gold catalysis from 2-alkynylindole-3-carbaldehyde oximes. We show that the efficiency of the annelation depends on several criteria such as nature of catalyst, steric hindrance induced by gold ligand and alkyne substituent. C-1 aminations were performed by activating the *N*-oxide with TFAA. Several ammonium salts were isolated prior to be used to perform  $S_NAr$  fluorinations under microwave irradiation. Even if yields remain moderate, we obtained for the first time 1-fluoro- $\gamma$ -carbolines after only few minutes. We hope that this method will be useful for designing other bioactive fluorocarboline using <sup>19</sup>F or <sup>18</sup>F to design PET tracers as example.

### 4. Experimental section

<sup>1</sup>H NMR and <sup>13</sup>C NMR spectra were recorded on a Bruker DPX 250 MHz or 400 MHz instrument using CDCl<sub>3</sub> or DMSO $d_{\delta}$ . The chemical shifts are reported in parts per million ( $\delta$  scale) and all coupling constant (J) values are in Hertz (Hz). The following abbreviations were used to explain the multiplicities: s (singlet), d (doublet), t (triplet), q (quartet), m (multiplet), dd (doublet doublet) and ddd (doublet doublet). Melting points are uncorrected. IR absorption spectra were obtained on a Perkin Elmer PARAGON 1000 PC and values are reported in cm<sup>-1</sup>. HRMS were recorded on a Bruker maXis mass spectrometer. Monitoring of the reactions was performed using silica gel TLC plates (silica Merck 60 F254). Spots were visualized by UV light at 254 nm and 356 nm. Chromatography Columns were performed using silica gel 60 (0.063-0.200 mm, Merck). Reactions requiring anhydrous conditions were performed under argon. All solvents were freshly distilled under argon prior to being used. Chemical products were commercially obtained from Aldrich and Alpha Aesar. Microwave irradiation was carried out in sealed 2-5 mL vessels placed in a Biotage Initiator system using a standard absorbance level (300 W maximum power). The temperatures were externally measured by an IR probe that determined the temperature on the surface of the vial and could be read directly from the instrument screen. The reaction time was measured from when the reaction mixture reached the stated temperature for temperature-controlled experiments. Pressure was measured by a non-invasive sensor embedded in the cavity lid.

#### 4.1. tert-Butyl 3-formyl-2-(phenylethynyl)-1H-indole-1carboxylate (**2a**)

To the solution of *tert*-butyl 2-bromo-3-formyl-*1H*-indole-1carboxylate **1a** (0.150 g, 0.7 mmol) in anhydrous THF (3 mL) TEA (0.2 mL, 1.4 mmol, 2.0 equiv.) and phenylacetylene (0.12 mL, 1.1 mmol, 1.5 equiv.) were added. The mixture was flushed by argon for 30 minutes then Pd(PPh<sub>3</sub>)<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub> (0.049 g, 5 %mol) and CuI (0.008 g, 0.04 mmol, 0.05 equiv.) were added. The reaction was stirred under argon atmosphere for 4 h at r.t. then filtered through a Celite® pad and the filtrate washed with EtOAc. After concentration under reduced pressure, the crude product was purified by silica gel chromatography using PE/EtOAc (9:1) to obtain the pure product as an orange solid (0.162 g, 96%). ### 4.2. tert-Butyl 3-formyl-2-[2-(p-tolyl)ethynyl]indole-1carboxylate (**2b**)

Compound 2b was obtained as described for 2a using 1a and 4-methylphenylacetylene. The crude product was purified by silica gel chromatography using PE/EtOAc (9:1) to obtain the pure product as a yellow solid (0.644 g, 95%). ### 4.3. tert-Butyl 3-formyl-2-[2-(m-tolyl)ethynyl]indole-1-carboxylate (2c)

Compound 2c was obtained as described for 2a using 1a and 2methylphenylacetylene The crude product was purified by silica gel chromatography using PE/EtOAc (9:1) to obtain the pure product as a pale brown solid (0.212 g, 96%). In a microwave tube a suspension of 6c (80 mg, 0.14 mmol, 1.0 equiv.) in ACN (1 mL) was stirred and TBAF in THF 1M (704 µL, 0.70 mmol, 5.0 equiv.) was added. The tube was sealed and heated up to 120°C under microwave irradiation for 30 min. After cooling, the solvent was removed under reduced pressure then the crude material was solubilized in THF (1 mL). Boc<sub>2</sub>O (46 mg, 0.21 mmol, 1.55 equiv.), DMAP (2 mg, 0.01 mmol, 0.1 equiv.) and Et<sub>3</sub>N (39 µL, 0.28 mmol, 2.0 equiv.) were added. The reaction mixture was left under stirring at r.t for 12h. Volatiles were removed under reduced pressure and the resulting crude was purified by flash chromatography using PE/EtOAc (95/5) to afford the desired product as a white solid (25.2 mg, 49%).
